IOWA ABLE – Jill Crosser, Associate Director, introduced Anna Magnusson, the new Executive Director. She reported on background information, goals, types of service, statistics, and outreach and group classes.

THE ARC OF STORY COUNTY ANNUAL REPORT – Tricia Crain, Executive Director, reported on programs, funding, awareness efforts, special projects, and grants received.

EYERLY BALL COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT – Cynthia Steidl Bishop, Chief Executive Officer, provided an overview of community based services. Heather Thomas, Outpatient Director, reported in detail about outpatient services. Krystina Engle, Mobile Crisis Services Director, reported initial responses and follow-up case management services.

Sanders stated there were two components of the amendment: to accommodate pass-through dollars from outside sources, and to amend for projects and funding carried over from the previous fiscal year. Sanders opened the public hearing at 10:36 a.m., and hearing none, he closed the public hearing at 10:36 a.m. Chitty moved, Olson seconded the approval of Resolution #19-06, FY19 Budget Amendment as presented. Roll call vote. (MCU) Markley stated she will present another budget amendment at the end of August.

RESOLUTION #19-09, FY18 FUND BALANCE RESOLUTION – Lisa Markley, Assistant Auditor, stated the resolution assigns fiscal year ending fund balances as required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) 54 standards. She provided information on restricted and committed funds. Olson moved, Chitty seconded the approval of Resolution #19-09, FY18 Fund Balance Resolution as presented. Roll call vote. (MCU)

– Deb Schildroth, Director of External Operations and County Services, provided background about the ASSET process, and funding priorities with respect to the County’s strategic planning. Schildroth requested direction to define the process and be more specific regarding volunteers. Discussion took place. Sanders directed Schildroth to meet with the ASSET volunteers to obtain specific priorities and also determine a possible additional funding process. Following these discussions, Schildroth will return to the Board.





Iowa Able is a non-profit, regulated lender focused on providing holistic financial services and education necessary for building credit and assets while attaining the assistive technology needed to work and live in Iowa communities. A lack of education in financial management, credit management, and asset building often contributes to the overall dependence on public benefits, family members, and outside organizations that Iowans with disabilities experience. Iowa Able Foundation's goal is to strengthen the long term financial health of individuals with disabilities and the aging to better prepare them to manage their finances and credit in a healthy environment.

Iowa Able provides services in the form of loans and financial coaching services (1:1 and in group settings). These loans are not grants, as the borrowers pay the amount borrowed plus interest. The program is designed to assist people with less-than-stellar credit ratings, those with limited income, and people who have little or no experience with credit. IAF interest rates are linked to the Wall Street Journal Prime Rate. For secured loans, the interest rate is the prime rate plus 4.25%. For unsecured loans the interest rate is 9.25%. IAF does not take security for Credit Builder Loans and the Foundation cannot secure real estate. The Iowa Able Foundation offers these loans to Iowans who need to purchase assistive technology such as specialized computers or software, wheelchairs, communication devices, home modifications, vehicle modifications and other devices; provides financing for small businesses and employment; and small loans to help individuals build or establish credit, manage cash flow, make monthly payments on time, etc. Loans generally range from \$500 to \$25,000 and can be used on their own or paired with donations or funding from other programs such as Vocational Rehabilitation, Easter Seals, or Medicaid waiver funds. The Iowa Able Foundation reports payments to credit bureaus through a partnership with the Credit Builders Alliance.

In 2017, the average credit score of approved borrowers was 510 and the average monthly income, including food stamps and other assistance, was \$1,823.09. The average loan amount was \$3,522.70 and borrowers represented 56 of Iowa's 99 counties. Of those approved for funding, 75% were referred for financial coaching. Individuals must live in Iowa and have a disability or be part of the aging community (65+). There are no fees passed on to participants for the group classes or individual financial coaching for loan applicants.

Financial Coaching services began 5 years ago and have been a core piece of our borrower's financial stability. Our goal to lend, educate and advance is strengthened through our coaching program. The foundation has 5 coaches on staff to assist borrowers throughout the state.

The Arc of Story County receives funding for four programs through the ASSET process.

Our Special Recreation Program, Active Lifestyles, continues to thrive in large part from the funding we receive from Story County, the City and United Way. We are serving almost 200 athletes this year. We added unified softball along with our regular softball teams this summer. The unified softball program joins golf and cheerleading as unified sports. We do exhaust our funds in early Spring each year. For fiscal year 2019, we received an increase in funding through CICS to see us through the last three months of programming each year. People with disabilities in Story County have grown to know Active LifeStyles programs as a safe, social and healthy activity to which they can participate, grow and be contributing members in our community.

The United Way of Story County is the only ASSET funder that supports us financially as The Arc advocates for people with disabilities. We have added "Raising Awareness" events to educate our members and self-advocates on issues that are important to them. This year we partnered with Planned Parenthood and held six classes on health and positive relationships. An ISU student completed her Food and Nutrition internship with The Arc by conducting fifteen classes on nutrition and cooking. And lastly, a group of students from Drake University who were in an Advocacy and Leadership class, held four classes for our self-advocates centered on advocacy development and community involvement. In September, The Arc will co-cost our bi-annual Legislative Forum.

Care Coordination is an important aspect of the day to day services The Arc provides. Families new to the community or in search of which services are suitable for their child, see The Arc as a place to receive answers and learn what is available in the community.

Project SEARCH is beginning its third year at Iowa State on August 6. This year, we move from only four students the past two years to ten students this fall. We have internship sights across campus including School of Ed., Recreational Services, Iowa State Daily, Transportation, Parks Library, Dining, Ivy College of Business to name a few. Project SEARCH is a nine-month long employment training program for individuals with intellectual and development disabilities. The participants receive classroom instruction coupled with three different internship rotations. Project SEARCH is a national program with an employment success rate of 92%. The Arc is not a typical employment provider. We saw a need in the community and researched the best program. IVRS will continue to provide funding for the internship portion of the nine month long program. This program has allowed us to meet the emerging needs of our participants and meet a growing need in our county for quality employment services for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The Arc has also been an integral member of getting the Inclusive Playground and Miracle Field to fruition in Story County. Regardless of whether one is in a wheelchair or has an intellectual disability, all people want and deserve the right to play, which is vital part of development and inclusion.

As always, it is a privilege for The Arc to provide services in Story County and use those services to assist others in living a life that the rest of us may take for granted.

Eyerly Ball Community Mental Health Services

August 31, 2018

Eyerly Ball Community Mental Health Services has been providing mental health services in Central Iowa for almost 50 years. Services began in Polk and Warren Counties and the Eyerly Ball's footprint has expanded in Central Iowa to include Story and Boone Counties. Our Mobile Crisis Team serves the entire 11 county Central Iowa Community Services Region. We currently provide services in two location, the Outpatient Clinic on University Avenue and Community Based Services on Duff Avenue. In August, a space opened giving us the opportunity to expand our office space allowing for all services to be provided in one location at our University Ave office site.

The following are a description of the services offered at Eyerly Ball in Story County.

Mobile Crisis Response

In partnership with CICS, Eyerly Ball is now offering a 24/7 Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT) to its 11-county region, which has been split into three sections for the response teams. The South Team covers Madison, Warren, Jasper and Poweshiek counties, the Central Team covers Greene, Boone, Story, and Marshall counties, and the North Team covers Hardin, Hamilton, and Franklin counties. CICS offers this service by contracting with Foundation 2 in Cedar Rapids, who provides the call center, and Eyerly Ball Community Mental Health Center in Des Moines, who provides the MCRT. All services are voluntary.

To access the MCRT, anyone within the 11 counties calls the Foundation 2 call center at 1-844-258-8858. The service is available to all ages, and anyone experiencing a crisis. The individual experiencing a crisis, a concerned relative, friend, or care provider, or a first responder can access the crisis line. Trained phone responders will assess the situation and deploy the MCRT if an in-person response is deemed necessary or helpful. A trained two-person team will leave as soon as they are dispatched and will respond to the scene within 60 minutes. The on-call counselors are able to perform various crisis assessments and will take the necessary time to determine if suicidal or homicidal ideations are present, if de-escalation and stabilization in the

field are possible, and if the client is willing to contract for safety by creating a safety plan tailored to meet their needs with our counselors. If transportation is necessary to ensure client safety, on-call counselors will transport voluntary clients ages 12 and above (with the presence of a parent or guardian for children and dependent adults). After the on-site interaction has been completed, counselors complete thorough documentation before becoming available for the next incoming call. Within 24 hours of the end of the crisis interaction, a case manager will attempt to make contact with the client and is available to provide up to 30 days of case management services. Case management can include, but is not limited to, exchanging information with current providers when signed ROIs are present, coordinating new appointments with existing providers, establishing care with new providers, providing transportation to and from appointments, and being present at appointments with new providers to provide reassurance to clients.

Case Management services have an average of seven contacts per each client, with an average of 16.18 days for each case, an 86% success rate on meeting at least one or more goals for each

client, and a 100% success rate for follow-up attempts at the 24 hour time frame post crisis call. As a team, we have several success stories since going live on March 26th, 2018.

Community Based Services

Assertive Community Treatment (ACT)

Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) is a team approach designed to provide comprehensive, community-based psychiatric treatment, medication management, rehabilitation, and support to individuals possessing a serious and persistent mental illness. A multi-disciplinary team of professionals, including a prescriber, team leader, social workers, a vocational specialist, a substance abuse specialist, and registered nurses provide these services 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

ACT is an evidence-based recovery model where services are individualized to meet the unique needs of each consumer and address all areas related to successful community living. The ACT team seeks to address all aspects of an individual's functioning and to help him/her nurture his/her life goals and integration into the community. In addition to possessing a serious and persistent mental illness, ACT clients have avoided or not responded well to traditional outpatient treatment and often have co-existing problems such as homelessness, substance abuse or criminal justice involvement.

Services Provided

Services and support provided include, but are not limited to:

- 24 hour/7 days a week access to staff
- Initial and ongoing assessments
- Person-centered treatment planning
- Psychiatric services
- Medication management
- Crisis intervention and immediate support
- Symptom management and skills teaching
- Family support and education
- Substance abuse services
- Physical health screening and care coordination

- Employment and housing assistance
- Case management
- Ongoing support and advocacy while hospitalized or incarcerated

Community Support Services (CSS)

Community Support Services (CSS) are provided to adults with a severe and persistent mental illness. These services are designed to support individuals as they live and work in the community.

CSS staff attempt to reduce or manage symptoms/reduced functioning that result from a mental illness. CSS staff work collaboratively with clients to create relationships that provide a balance between support of the mental illness and allow for maximum individual independence.

Community support program components include: (1) monitoring of mental health symptoms and functioning/reality orientation; (2) transportation; (3) supportive relationship; (4) communication with other providers; (5) assistance in attending appointments and obtaining medications; (6) crisis intervention and development of a crisis plan; (7) development and coordination of natural mental health support systems.

CSS staff meet with each client one to two times each month.

Supported Community Living (SCL)

Supported Community Living (SCL) services provide individualized skill building, teaching, and support to individuals with mental illness in the community.

Services and support provided include but are not limited to ongoing assessment and treatment planning, assistance with goal setting and achievement, community based skills teaching, symptom management and community integration.

SCL staff meet with each client one to two times per week.

Integrated Health

Integrated Health Home (IHH)

Integrated Health Home is a voluntary program for adults with a serious mental illness. An Integrated Health Home is not a “place”, but a “process” where a team of professionals work together to provide whole-person, client-centered, coordinated care to adults with a serious

mental illness. The vision of Integrated Health Home services is for all individuals we serve to have access to services and supports in their communities, so they can successfully reach their optimal potential.

In Story County the IHH team serves 165 adults and provides intensive care management for 153 of those clients. The IHH team consists of Care Coordinators, Peer Support Specialist, and Nurse Care Coordinator. Together the IHH team focuses on improving health outcomes of Individuals, improve appropriate utilization of care, and increasing the use of preventive services.

Outpatient Services

Outpatient Services

Mental health therapy and Medication management services are provided at 2521 S. University Avenue, Suite 121. Our team of licensed professionals utilize recovery focused, evidence based practices. We believe in person centered treatment in which each individual served is a partner in their treatment experience. New clients are able to seek services during our walk in times in which therapy evaluations may be provided on the same day. For current walk in times call the office at 598-3300. Most insurances are accepted including Medicaid and Medicare. Assistance is also available, to those who qualify, with no insurance coverage..

As a community mental health center one of our greatest assets is our ability to provide a continuum of services in coordination with the outreach teams.


Connections

The Connections Program is an exciting and flexible service available in the Ames area (and surrounding 11 counties) which partners with hospitals, county services, and the police department to reduce emergency room visits and psychiatric hospitalizations. Connections also assist with gaps in services by connecting individuals with the best resources to match their need. Insurance is never charged and no funding is required from those served. The Connection staff provides short term assistance in a variety of ways including:


- care coordination



ANIMAL RESCUE SERVICE CONTRACT

This contract and Agreement is entered into by and between Story County, Iowa and the City of Kelley, Iowa pursuant to the authority, and by the procedures of Chapter 28E, Code of Iowa.

1. Purpose:

Under this contract, Story County shall provide said City with services of domestic animal rescue as set forth more specifically in succeeding paragraphs herein with the exception of 2(e) and (f). Story County will not provide service with regard to wild animals except as noted below in the Scope of Services, and in the sole discretion of Story County.

2. Scope of services (pursuant to Story County Code of Ordinances):

- a. Transportation of animals impounded by the contracting city.
- b. Shelter and board for the impounded animals.
- c. Issuance of applicable impoundment charges on impounded animals pursuant to Story County Code of Ordinances.
- d. Cat, dog, and other small domesticated animal adoption service for appropriately impounded animals.
- e. Investigation and disposition of rabid, sick or injured animals.
- f. Supervision of quarantine procedures and rabies testing.
- g. Collection and impounding of City trapped cats.
- h. Arrange for emergency veterinary care or provision of first-aid treatment.
- i. Provision of humane euthanasia of unclaimed cats and dogs pursuant to Iowa Code 351.37.
- j. Rescue of animals in unusual or emergency circumstances (i.e. flood waters, fire, etc., with permission from appropriate City Official).

- k. One letter sent to resident of said City when requested by said City and only after prior attempts at resolution by City.

Any other animal control related problem may be dealt with at the Animal Control Officer's discretion.

The City understands that all service is subject to the Animal Control Officer's availability and discretion with the expressed approval of a City Official, except in emergencies.

3. Consideration: (Quarterly billing)

The City will pay Story County, Iowa, based on the following fee schedule:

(No trip charge will be assessed from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday – Friday)

- a. \$50.00 per officer involved, per trip between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m., Monday through Friday, all day Saturday, Sunday and holidays.
- b. \$25.00 per trip for investigations (regardless of whether or not an animal is detained), confining an animal, and other services as needed.
- c. \$6.50 per day up to a maximum of seven (7) days per unclaimed dog for boarding and transportation costs.
- d. \$5.50 per day up to a maximum of seven (7) days per unclaimed cat for boarding and transportation costs.
- e. \$5.50 per day up to a maximum of seven (7) days per unclaimed exotic animal for boarding and transportation costs.
- f. \$10.00 per day up to a maximum of seven (7) days per unclaimed head of livestock for boarding and transportation costs. Depending on animal size, if a trailer is needed to transport an animal, add an additional \$35.00.
- g. \$15.00 for euthanasia of each unclaimed or unwanted cat not held for seven (7) days, due to sickness, injury or rabies testing.
- h. \$25.00 for euthanasia of each unclaimed or unwanted dog not held for seven (7) days, due to sickness, injury or rabies testing.
- i. \$20.00 for euthanasia of each wild animal species such as opossum, raccoon, etc.
- j. \$5.00 per day for rental of cat box trap.
- k. \$8.00 per day for rental of dog box trap.
- l. \$10.00 per citation issued at the request of said City.

- m. \$10.00 handling/transportation charge for all domestic animals held less than seven (7) days.
- n. At the discretion of said City and Animal Control, an animal may be held and boarded for less than a minimum seven (7) days if the animal is:
Significantly sick or injured, ill-tempered or vicious, feral/wild (not adoptable, applicable to cats and dogs only), believed to have been exposed to a disease infectious to animals or humans.

4. Rescue and removal charges:

For any animal in unusual or emergency circumstances - \$50.00 per trip, per Animal Control Officer needed, and any other applicable fees (which may include, but are not limited to, Sheriff's Office invoices for service).

All diagnostic and/or quarantine costs shall be paid by the City.

5. Recording requirements:

In Accordance with Iowa Code Chapter 28E, a copy of this agreement shall be filed with the Secretary of State and recorded with the Story County Recorder.

6. Termination:

Either party may terminate this agreement without penalty at any time by giving written notice at least thirty (30) days before the effective date of such termination.

7. Effective date:

This agreement shall become effective upon formal passage and execution of the Board of Supervisors above named and upon filing of this agreement with the Secretary of State of Iowa.

8. Duration and term:

The initial term of this agreement shall be for a period of one year commencing on July 1, 2018, and terminating on June 30, 2019.
