(all audio of meetings available at storycountyia.gov). Heddens noted due to recommendations for social distancing in order to help slow the spread of the COVID-19 virus and limited space, the meeting will be provided via Zoom originating from the Story County Administration Building.

ADOPTION OF AGENDA: Faisal moved, Murken seconded adopting the agenda as presented. Motion carried unanimously (MCU) on a roll call vote.

CENTRAL IOWA TOURISM REGION (CITR): Ann Vogalbacher, Executive Director, highlighted items from the submitted written report as well as the travel guide.

The portions requested are all short segments in the unincorporated town of Iowa Centre. Moon reviewed the process, the relevant portions of the *Code of Iowa*, and provided site photos and maps. The public hearings will take place this week. The action to vacate will be presented next week. Heddens opened the public hearing for Jackson Street at 10:36 a.m., and, hearing none, she closed the public hearing for Jackson Street at 10:36 a.m. Heddens opened the public hearing for Boone Street at 10:37 a.m., and, hearing none, she closed the public hearing for Boone Street at 10:37 a.m. Moon reported the request for the Boone Street portion is from the County Conservation Director. Discussion took place. Heddens opened the public hearing for 180th Street at 10:40 a.m., and, hearing none, she closed the public hearing for 180th Street at 10:40 a.m. Moon stated he would add the resolutions to next week's agenda.

FIVE-YEAR SECONDARY ROADS CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM NEEDS: Darren Moon, Engineer, reported on the process within the County and with the Iowa Department of Transportation. He reviewed the project worksheet. Murken moved, Faisal seconded the approval of the Five-Year Secondary Roads Construction Program Needs as submitted. Roll call vote. (MCU)

AUTHORIZING ONE FULL-TIME GENERAL ASSISTANT SERVICE COORDINATOR POSITION WITHIN COMMUNITY SERVICES TO BE FILLED IN FY21: Karla Webb, Community Service Director, reported on hiring the approved and budgeted position. Discussion took place. Faisal moved, Murken seconded the approval of the job description and to authorize one full-time General Assistant Service Coordinator Position within Community Services, to be filled in FY21. Roll call vote. (MCU)

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLAN (CIP) FY22-26: Leanne Harter, County Outreach and Special Projects Manager, reported on the process. She proposed one wording change. Murken asked about the space needs study effect on next year's projects. Joby Brogden, Facilities Management Director, reported on the space study. Discussion took place. Murken moved, Faisal seconded the approval of Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) for FY2022-2026 as submitted. Roll call vote. (MCU)

DISCUSSION OF DRAFT STORY COUNTY JAKE BREAK ORDINANCE: Darren Moon, Engineer, reported on the request a year ago for Riverside Road. This is an exploratory issue. Moon has spoken with other counties and received

information about what not to do and how to enforce. Discussion took place. Moon reported on signage. Captain Nick Lennie, Sheriff's Office, stated the request has been made before. It is difficult to enforce; he reported on challenges. Heddens asked if this for limited to a specific location. Moon reported. Additional discussion took place. Murken reported on concerns, voluntary signage, and increasing awareness. Faisal concurred. Murken recommended offering voluntary signs.

UPCOMING AGENDA ITEMS: Murken reported the Board will discuss drafting new procedures for selecting members for Boards and Commissions next week.

Thank you to the many members and partners of the Ames Convention and Visitors Bureau (Ames CVB). This past year has been one for the history books for the Ames CVB Board, President/CEO and Staff. We continue to strive to showcase Ames as the premier destination for industry conferences, continuing education, regional and national sporting activities and the business and individual traveler. We continue to seek new and exciting avenues that will bring more visitors to Ames.

Yes, despite a pandemic, despite our mega events Odyssey of the Mind World Finals and Farm Progress Show canceling (along with many other annual events), and despite the hospitality and travel industry taking a mighty hit in 2020, we are indeed still striving to showcase Ames and to seek new avenues to bring more visitors to Ames, because *Travel Matters*.

Travel Matters to our economy, in good times and in bad times. In 2020, overnight visitors accounted for an estimated \$75 million dollars in our community by staying at our hotels, dining in our restaurants, purchasing tickets to events and by shopping in Ames. That is down from the \$114 million spent in 2019, re-affirming how important visitors are in supporting the Ames economy.

Travel Matters to connecting Ames and Iowa State University to visitors. Throughout 2020, the Board focused on re-defining the Ames CVB's mission and setting a plan in motion for continuing to seek out and bring new groups and visitors to Ames and Iowa State University. With staff and programming re-structured, new sales and marketing initiatives are being developed and implemented.

Travel Matters to new experiences. Our Community Grant Program continues to support and focus on creating new events and enhancing existing events and improving the quality of life aspect in Ames. In 2020, the Community Grant Program was a financial contributor to over 29 events, awarding over \$80,000 in grant funding. Most of those events unfortunately had to postpone or cancel due to the pandemic, but we are pleased to announce that 20 events rolled over into 2021, with full grant funding.

Thank you for your continued support of the Ames Convention and Visitors Bureau.



2020 ANNUAL HIGHLIGHTS

While 2020 took an unexpected turn, our team navigated the speed bumps along the way to successfully re-route a new course for events and services. Buckle-up for a review of the historic year at the Ames Convention and Visitors Bureau:

COMMUNICATIONS: In addition to our CYtes of Ames and Iowa State University Guide (print visitors guide), weekly E-Newsletters, and event client projects, Communications introduced Slightly Off Center, Guide to Ames, a smart, quirky, fun guide for Ames residents. Slightly Off Center, Guide to Ames featured CYtes of Ames member coupons and lists of things to DO and SHOP right here in our own backyard!

MEMBER & VISITOR SERVICES: The Ames CVB Annual Meeting kicked off the year with Putting Ames on the Map and celebrating our CYtes of Ames members. Partnering with Conference Planning and Management, we welcomed incoming Iowa State University freshmen and their families during ISU Move-In and offered a fun family activity featuring our CYtes of Ames Scavenger Hunt. We completed our first ever in-person membership blitz in the fall, focusing on a theme of "Grateful for You".

ISU EXTENSION & OUTREACH CONFERENCE PLANNING & MANAGEMENT: Offering "one-stop" shopping for event management services has never been more important than this past year. Conference Planning and Management hosted 27 face to face events in Ames, and pivoted to offer virtual event services, including assisting with over 25 virtual and hybrid events, reaching over 13,207 attendees for both in person and online events. In addition, Conference Planning and Management now offers a new more comprehensive online event platform, further meeting the needs of their clients. Registration Services managed over 1,299 events, including new events such as online plant sales and registration for a local garden's new destination experience, allowing for timed admissions. In a joint effort with Conference Planning and Management, Registration Services and Ames CVB, a successful virtual blitz was held for Iowa State University clients.

SPORTS & LEISURE SALES/EVENTS: Despite the pandemic, Ames hosted nearly half of the already scheduled events and programming, accounting for over 42,000 visitors to Ames. Out of the 64 events hosted, 31 were from All Iowa Attack (educational and national-level competitive basketball programming).

AMES CONVENTION & VISITORS BUREAU COMMUNITY GRANT PROGRAM: \$80,000 in Community Grants were awarded to 29 different organizations hosting events scheduled throughout the Ames area in 2020. Each event was designed to attract new visitors, enhance the visitor experience and improve the quality of life for area residents (for a full list of Community Grant recipients, please see the following page).




The road ahead is full of beautiful scenery - with a steady flow of traffic for returning events and visitors. New opportunities are just around the bend!

Story County Board of Supervisors

Crisis Child Care provides child care to families of children ages 0-12 that are experiencing an emergency or crisis situation (i.e. hospitalization, homelessness or domestic violence) and lack of family support/social supports to provide safe, appropriate care for their children. Placements are provided for a maximum of 72 continuous hours in the home of a registered child development home provider or licensed foster care provider. To be eligible for Crisis Child Care a family must reside in Story County, have a child age(s) 0-12 and be experiencing a crisis situation. We have staff on call 24/7 that is available to help with placement.

During the current fiscal year we have not been able to serve any families, and have had to turn away 15 families. COVID has taken it's effect on the usage of crisis care. Our main provider has had to shut down three times due to exposure inside her own regular childcare. This issue has caused providers uncomfortable taking outside children in, just in case they've been exposed. Once exposed the daycare must shut down, which means the provider isn't making any income during that time. Our additional biggest struggle in Story County is obtaining child care providers who are willing to take placements. Story County is facing a child care crisis still, which means there are not enough child care spaces, or affordable spaces for the amount of children in Story County. This has been an ongoing issue from last year that the county is still struggling with. As providers are full we are unable to place children during the day to align with DHS regulations. Currently this fiscal year we have turned away 10 families in Story County that we have tracked. We have also lost our two biggest providers due to both of them leaving the child care career path and finding different jobs.

Our biggest focus this year is finding new providers. We have been working closely within our compliance, human resource and marketing department to expand our services. We are now approved to bring on providers that are registered foster families. They receive oversight through DHS as well as whatever agency they are certified through. This will work the same way it has with our registered day care providers, hopefully this will expand our provider area.

LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES CONTRACT

On this 16th day of February, 2021, the City of Zearing and Story County, Iowa, enter into the following agreement:

1. The Story County Sheriff's Office will provide the City of Zearing, Iowa, with law enforcement services. These services will include but not be limited to:
 - A. Radar operations to control speed.
 - B. Issuing violations under city ordinances (excluding animal control ordinances) upon request.
 - C. Housing inmates who have been incarcerated under a city ordinance.
 - D. Service of abatement notices on request.
 - E. Periodically checking commercial buildings for unlocked doors and trespassers.
 - F. Investigation of traffic accidents and complaints.
 - G. Dispatch of city fire departments and first responders.
 - H. Staffing a 24 hour E911 dispatch center.
 - I. Providing a detective division to investigate crimes and conduct on-going investigations.
 - J. Investigation of drug-related offenses.
 - K. Supplying schools or community clubs with officers and materials for special programs and talks upon request.
 - L. Routine patrols and special patrols upon request.
 - M. Supply fully equipped patrol cars with radio, lights, siren and all related equipment, gasoline and oil, tires and maintenance, uniforms and all other personal equipment.

2. In consideration for the law enforcement services above described, the City of Zearing, Iowa will pay a per capita rate of \$63.58 (based on the 2010 census of 554) to Story County, Iowa, which amounts to the annual sum of \$35,223.32. This shall be paid in equal quarterly installments to the Story County Sheriff on July 1, October 1, January 1 and April 1. Any per capita increase in contract cost for the following year shall be negotiated by December for the next fiscal year. For the purposes of this contract, fiscal year shall be from July 1, through June 30, of the following year.





3. The Sheriff shall be the administrator of this Agreement. Law Enforcement policy, regulations and matters pertaining to the employment of the Sheriff's personnel shall be determined solely by the Sheriff. The time, place and manner in which these services are implemented shall be in the sole discretion of the Sheriff. The Mayor, Mayor Pro Tem and the City Administrator shall be authorized to make requests to the Sheriff for performance of specific law enforcement services as specified in this Agreement.
4. The initial term of the Agreement shall be automatically extended for successive one-year periods upon the same terms and conditions provided by this Agreement for the initial term, unless this Agreement is terminated or modified by the express election of either city or county as hereinafter provided. Modification of this contract may be made by mutual consent of both parties.
5. In accordance with Chapter 28E, Code of Iowa, a copy of this agreement shall be filed with the Secretary of State and recorded with the Story County Recorder. Signatures will include the Mayor of Zearing, the City Clerk of Zearing, the Chairperson of the Story County Board of Supervisors, the Story County Auditor and the Story County Sheriff. The city seal shall be affixed to the contract before returning to the county for filing.
6. The city shall fund the consideration for this Agreement from general revenues under the City's annual general budget. There shall be no joint property acquired pursuant to this agreement.
7. This contract may be terminated by either party. Termination is effective at the end of the current quarterly billing cycle and must be preceded with a 30 day written notice to either party. Notice shall be accomplished by certified mail or personal service.

8. The Permittee shall indemnify and save harmless Story County from any and all causes of action, suits at law or in equity, or losses, damages, claims, or demands, and from any and all

liability and expense of whatsoever nature for, on account of or due to the acts or omissions of said Permittee's officers, members, agents, representatives, contractors, employees or assigns arising out of or in connection with its (or their) use or occupancy of the public highway under this permit.

9. Noncompliance with any of the terms of permit, or agreement, may be considered cause for shut down of utility construction operations, or revocation of the permit.

10. The following special requirements, if applicable, shall apply to this permit:

Whenever the route of the proposed cable line runs along a paved secondary highway, the location of said cable shall be constructed on top of the road shoulder so as to be within approximately two-feet of the pavement edge.

Whenever the route of the proposed cable line runs along a dirt or gravel surfaced highway, the location of said cable shall be constructed on top of the road surface and as near possible to the shoulder line

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The crossing of the cable line from one side of the highway to the other shall be accomplished at a near right angle rather than diagonally so as to disturb the roadbed of the traveled way as little as possible.

Whenever the route of the proposed cable line is to cross a paved highway, such crossing shall be in a bored hole rather than open cut trench.

General Definition of Work

Work is performed under the regular supervision of the Community Services Director or Community Services Program Coordinator.

Essential Functions

- 1) Coordinates activities for case referrals from other agencies in order to determine eligibility for centralized intake including service coordination services.
- 2) Performs centralized intake duties for rent and utility assistance; assesses client's needs and obtains additional information and/or evaluations; refers applicants to other resources as needed.
- 3) Facilitates client referral process with appropriate agencies; participates in meetings to ensure stability and further progress towards long term housing goals.
- 4) Monitors and ensures compliance of program with applicable federal, state and local standards; maintains necessary documentation; prepares reports by using a management information system.
- 5) Assists in developing outreach materials for the purpose of education, prevention and public awareness.
- 6) Establishes working relationships with area professionals, service providers, landlords and the community at-large to combat the problem of homelessness in the community; assess housing barriers by people at-risk of becoming homeless to determine housing and service needs.
- 7) Receives and responds to various community and stakeholder inquiries; attends meetings; serves on committees or provides training on department related topics.
- 8) Performs General Assistance duties; reviews applications, obtains necessary information to determine client's eligibility for assistance.
- 9) Assists in the development and implementation of General Assistance and centralized intake policies and procedures.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

Thorough knowledge of standard office practices, procedures, equipment and secretarial techniques; thorough knowledge of business English, spelling and arithmetic; thorough knowledge of department programs and policies; ability to type accurately at a reasonable rate of speed; ability to organize, prioritize and plan work to meet deadlines; ability to make effective decisions; ability to operate standard office equipment and related hardware and software; ability to learn specialized software related to department needs; ability to follow oral and written instructions; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with associates, clients and the general public.

Education and Experience

Bachelor's degree in behavioral science, education, health care, human services, social science, nursing or related field and moderate experience, or equivalent combination of education and experience.

Special Requirements

Applicable position, department, organization and professional training will be provided and must be completed upon hire and on an ongoing basis.



Introduction

The Story County Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) is a multi-year guide to the construction and/or improvement of county facilities and the acquisition of equipment. Through the process of preparing and updating this CIP, the County meets the need for orderly maintenance of the County's physical assets. This CIP is intended to serve as a planning tool and is structured to present meaningful long-range perspective of the County's long-range capital needs and to be used as an implementation tool for the acquisition, development, construction, maintenance, and renovation of public facilities, infrastructure, and capital equipment.

The Story County Board of Supervisors first identified the development of this Plan in the May 2013 Strategic Plan adopted by the Board and have adopted a CIP each following year. The CIP runs on a fiscal year basis – July 1st through June 30th, and defines projects on a five year timeframe.

The CIP adopts the 5-Year Story County Secondary Road Construction Program, updated and adopted annually, by reference.

The following project timeframes are identified in this current CIP:

Current Projects	Those in the current FY cycle (FY21)
Year 1	FY 22: July 2021 – June 2022
Year 2	FY 23: July 2022 – June 2023
Year 3	FY 24: July 2023 – June 2024
Year 4	FY 25: July 2024 – June 2025
Year 5	FY 26: July 2025 – June 2026



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Process to Develop CIP

It is anticipated that the CIP is reviewed annually and is updated as necessary. Preparation of the CIP is an interactive process that takes approximately four to six months each cycle. The CIP is developed in a manner consistent with approved County financial policies that set guidelines for the CIP and for the funding of maintenance and replacement projects.

Elected Officials and Department Heads were asked to submit proposed projects in December 2020 in line with the initial budget preparations. County staff members reviewed proposed projects and identified those to recommend to the Board of Supervisors to include in the CIP. As budgets were prepared and submitted, additional projects were included as identified through the Board of Supervisors' worksessions in January 2021.

The projects are categorized beginning on page seven by year as noted above. The CIP is not meant to be a static document - it is intended to help the Board of Supervisors in their budgeting discussions and prioritization. As a guiding document, it may be amended as warranted.



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Terms and Definitions

Story County has defined key terms in order to help guide the development of this CIP.

Capital Assets

Capital assets include land, facilities, parks, playgrounds and outdoor structures, special projects from Secondary Roads, pedestrian and bicycle systems, water and sewer infrastructure, technology systems and equipment, and other items of value from which the County derives benefit for a significant number of years.

Capital Projects

Capital projects result in economic activities that lead to the acquisition, construction, or extension of the useful life of capital assets. They have a total project cost in the range of \$25,000 or more; range from construction of new buildings to renovations, additions, conversions, or demolitions of existing buildings; have a useful life of five years or longer, significantly extend the useful life of an asset, or significantly alter the nature and character of an asset (not to include annual asset maintenance costs, annual warranty costs or other ongoing costs.)

The CIP includes four different types of projects: equipment, new project/construction (and project continuation to following years), modification of existing project, and maintenance.

- ◆ **Equipment**

The proposed purchases/lease/rental of equipment, including vehicles, software, hardware, and other applications when the costs exceed \$75,000.

Projects such as new building(s), land acquisition, remodels, and related items costing over \$25,000 are included and identified in one the following three categories:

- ◆ **New Project/Construction**
- ◆ **Modification of Existing Project (includes project extension)**
- ◆ **Building Maintenance**

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Projects

Projects are listed in order of potential fiscal year in which the project may be undertaken. However, as this is a dynamic document, project schedules may change and be moved up or down on the timeframe, due to many factors, such as budget, staffing, and priorities. Also, estimated amounts and potential funding sources are meant only as guidance in this document. Elected Officials, Department Heads, and the Board of Supervisors identify the projects and funding mechanisms in the annual budget process.

ORDINANCE PROHIBITING

THE UNLAWFUL USE OF ENGINE AND COMPRESSION BRAKES

JAKE BRAKE ORDINANCE

Chapter X.xx

PURPOSE: The purpose of this ordinance is to prohibit the excessive, loud, unusual or explosive use of engine retarding and compressed air-braking devices within designated areas in Story County.

DEFINITIONS: For the purposes of this ordinance the following words and phrases are defined as follows:

1. "Engine retarding brake" means a "Dynamic Brake", "Jake Brake", "Jacobs Brake", "C-Brake", "Compression Brake", "Paccar Brake", transmission brake or any other engine retarding brake system that alters the normal compression of the engine and subsequently releases that compression in such a manner as to emit more than 80 decibels of noise within/at a distance of/more than 50 feet.

PROHIBITIONS: It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to use or operate or cause to be used or operated within designated areas in the unincorporated areas of the County of Story, State of Iowa, any engine retarding brake, compression brake or mechanical exhaust device designed to aid in the braking or deceleration of any vehicle that results in excessive, loud, unusual or explosive noise from such vehicle, unless such use is necessary to avoid imminent danger/emergency/to avoid injury or accident. Such prohibition shall be applicable only to those public highways or portions specifically identified in this Chapter.

AREAS OF PROHIBITION: The prohibition set forth herein shall apply to the following public highways in Story County, Iowa or portions thereof:

1. W. Riverside Road from Hwy 69 east 3500'.

SIGNAGE: Signs stating "VEHICLE NOISE LAWS ENFORCED" or "ENGINE BRAKE ORDINANCE ENFORCED" may be installed at locations deemed appropriate by the Board of Supervisors to advise motorists of the prohibitions contained in this ordinance, except that no sign stating "VEHICLE NOISE LAWS ENFORCED" or "ENGINE BRAKE ORDINANCE ENFORCED" shall be installed on a state highway without a permit from the Iowa Department of Transportation. The provisions of this ordinance shall be in full force and effect even if no signs are installed.

EXCEPTIONS: Emergency vehicles shall be exempt from the application of this ordinance.

VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES: ordinance is deemed to be a county infraction. The penalty for violating any of the provisions of this Chapter shall be as set forth in Chapter X.xx.
